Dear coaches with an interest in an enduring and relevant profession,

An Invitation – Call for Proposals

This is an invitation to prepare a proposal to facilitate a concurrent session for ICFA's Conference, *Creating Future Stories Together*, to be held in Adelaide, South Australia, 31 Aug – 2 Sept 2009.

We invite you to refine and submit your ideas about how coaches and coaching can provide leadership in responding to the significant economic and ecological issues of our time and to creating our shared global future.

The proposals we seek are those that:

- widen and deepen our perspectives on “what is being asked of us now”;
- that facilitate an opening of our hearts and minds to what is needed and how we each need to change and develop;
- that provide spaces for advanced conversations about how coaching itself needs to evolve;
- and connects us as colleagues to support each other, share learning and develop our practice together for a global purpose.

This conference is a process of awakening, connecting and moving to authentic commitments to take action for greater sustainability. Within the Call for Proposals you will find that the conference is designed to move through four phases to facilitate change. **In addition to those with valuable content to share, we welcome proposals that will facilitate and enrich this process.**

Please pass this invitation to other professionals you believe may have a contribution to make to this conference. Participation is not limited to coaches – we require a broad and diverse range of ideas, experiences and knowledge to make this a stimulating and effective event.

The Context

The proposition underpinning this conference is that our shared global future depends on a greater recognition of and accommodation to Earth's limits

to growth. The time for greater sustainability across all aspects of life and work is now AND our personal stories are linked to the unfolding global narrative.

Our theme follows on from the 2007 ICFA conference in Melbourne and focuses not only on what is happening around us, but on co-creating solutions. We believe that coaching has an important role to play in developing a new story of sustainability. One that is environmentally sustainable so that future generations may enjoy healthy lives in a healthy environment full of diverse creatures. One that is personally and spiritually fulfilling such that we may give away our addiction to materialism that drives consumerism. One that is socially just and connected so that we may encourage and empower each other on this journey into the largely unknown.

We now ask...

- **Why should we do something about our global situation?**
- **What might that mean for us personally and professionally?**
- **What might that mean for coaching as a profession?**
- **What needs to change?**
- **How will we contribute?**

It is a bold conversation for a maturing professional body. It is more than the traditional coaching conference we have come to expect. It is a conversation about our relevance, our legacy, and our destiny – at this pivotal time in history.

Our Intention

This conversation will, we believe, lead the coaching world – as you and other professionals from various disciplines choose to participate. We intend it to be a catalyst for global change on multiple levels. Change for us as individuals living through this chaotic time. Change for us as business owners needing to make a viable living and desiring to do so in a meaningful manner. Change for us as developers of leadership capacity in businesses, organisations and communities. And, change for us as colleagues reflecting upon our practice as coaches.

Some of the story behind the Conference development

As in nature, where innovation often springs from some of the most isolated places, this conversation will take place in Adelaide, South Australia. How did this come about?

The story of the organising team for this conference is relevant to answering this question – and this story also illustrates the connection between our personal stories and that of our unfolding global future.

My growing sense of concern about our global future emerged from inviting and meeting John Whitmore at ICFA's second conference in 2003. My growing sense of unease was fuelled by subsequent reading and research. Further conversations with John and the establishment of Be The Change here in Australia put me in contact with people locally and globally, who were entertaining similar thoughts. What a relief!

I first met David Drake at the St Louis ICF global conference in 2006. We shared a concern for the future of humanity that was discussed so explicitly in the ICFA 2007 Melbourne conference where we met for a second time. At that time I also introduced David to Kim Lisson's business partner, Michael Prince. They sponsored a narrative coaching workshop that David ran in Perth, where he met Kim.

Kim Lisson and I have known each other for approximately 10 years, through association with our coach training school. We have stayed in touch and over the last 18 months or so, our individual interest has grown regarding what is happening on a global scale and how we can individually respond. We have shared many interesting conversations. Kim wrote an article entitled *The Inner Work of Sustainability* in the ICFA newsletter earlier this year, that moved me to respond with my thoughts and we co-authored a second article.

With David's frequent travel to Australia, all four of us found ourselves drawn together to discuss how we could support each other in our individual and business quests to 'be sustainable' and to promote sustainability. After clearing my desk and office of clutter in May this year, I answered a phone call from Corene Walker, Director of Events with ICFA, who was seeking a person to chair the development of a conference focussed on stories and sustainability.

I have been involved in the development of three out of four of ICFA's previous conferences and I am familiar with the work involved. To be honest I hesitated because of this and yet the issue of global

sustainability is such a compelling and important one, that I was unable to ignore the call.

I shared the opportunity with 'the team' that grew to include Fiona Toy, with whom I have worked closely in the past on previous conferences, and we came to an agreement that this was a project we would like to undertake together.

For each of the Core Conference Team members, the development of this conference is certainly a fulfilment of our vocation. It is the expression of our joy in working together, our friendship, our individual strengths and our combined wisdom. We look forward to your potential contribution in meeting what we see as the dominant need of the world and the most profound opportunity for coaching.

Significantly, we are not alone in our assessment that 'sustainability' has become the issue of our times. We acknowledge and honour the ICFA Board for its recognition of this issue and its leadership in developing the theme.

The conference venue, the Adelaide Convention Centre, is one of the greenest venues in Australia and suits our theme perfectly. They have a range of initiatives to minimise the environmental impact of their operations and our food will, as much as possible, be sourced from less than 100 miles around – all wines will easily meet this criteria, with one of Australia's major wine growing and making regions on our doorstep!

We look forward to the opportunity to make this conference a special and significant time for you – for coaching – and with humility, for Earth.

Conference Overview

We are the midst of a global economic crisis and a growing awareness of the consequences of our impact on our planet and its people. As such, this is not a time for 'business as usual' for any of us. While there are many views on what is to be done, overall there is a growing sense of what Paul Hawken refers to as the 'blessed unrest.' People everywhere are responding to the call to take greater individual and collective action in seizing the opportunities to make a difference in how we work and live.

As coaches, we are impacted by the current economic conditions at many levels AND we are often uniquely positioned to rise to this occasion with what we do best. It is time for creating a new story about coaching that is equal to the task of what is before us.

On the surface it may appear that our stories, and that of our clients, are 'merely' personal. But are not all these individual stories, and the choices in them, connected to larger shared narratives about things like economics, ethics and ecology? Are we ready to challenge ourselves, our profession and our clients to engage in the important conversations we need to have about a sustainable future?

This conference is aimed at a professional body that is maturing and ready to seriously consider what we are doing and why. It is about connecting the deeply personal and the profoundly global through coaching. It is an opportunity to collectively address a challenge we all face, whether we are an internal or external practitioner: How to run a viable and vibrant practice AND effectively engage the urgent and larger global issues of our time.

As such, we will focus on how to live sustainable lives, build sustainable practices, provide sustainable leadership, and develop more sustainable organisations and communities. In doing so, we will increase our sense of personal responsibility, our professional viability and global sustainability. We hope to be able to offer a broad range workshops and conversations, some from fields beyond coaching, to equip us to be better partners with our clients and better leaders in responding to these times.

Conference Design

The ICF Australasia 2009 Conference in Adelaide is being designed around four streams to provide a flow for learning across the two days.

- Searching for sustainable lives
- Building more sustainable practices
- Developing more sustainable leadership
- Enabling more sustainable organisations and communities

Each of these phases will have offerings for:

- new coaches
- intermediate coaches
- advanced coaches
- coaching leaders, educators etc.

General Guidelines

The Core Conference Planning Team is seeking sessions that prepare and inspire coaches to have a greater impact on the future by providing:

- Approaches that engage participants as whole learners and whole beings, not just coaches or business professionals.
- Opportunities for provocative learning that incorporates narrative themes, case studies, collaborative presentations, and more
- Opportunities for dialogue in order to gain new knowledge, skills, tools, connections and resources—and the courage and confidence to use them.
- A variety of views on and a constructive challenge to the assumptions of coaches and coaching as a whole.
- Steps and strategies that coaches can use to increase their mastery (proposals that are primarily designed as marketing vehicles will not be considered)
- Compelling and practical means to engage, enable and energise participants to take action in the session, at the conference, and upon returning 'home.'
- Innovative techniques and technologies, opportunities to build and deepen networks, and research and scholar-practitioner support.

Selection Process

Submissions are considered using a peer review process. The Core Conference Team members will create a team of senior coaches (and content experts where appropriate) to review proposals and make recommendations to the Conference Executive Team chaired by the ICF Australasia Director of Events. This Executive Team will make a recommendation for the conference program to the ICF Australasia Board of Directors for acceptance. All decisions by the Board are final.

Conference Streams

1. Searching for Sustainable Lives

In the morning of the first day, the focus is on exploring the current global situation and examining our own stories about it in order to better understand what we may have to leave behind, personally and professionally, in order to rethink our roles. In doing so, what will engage us to step forward? The aim is to support each of us to notice where we are now, what the new calls to action are, and what it might mean for our own personal and professional sustainability as part of this process.

We are seeking proposals for sessions that help participants address questions such as:

- a. What is happening that is challenging 'business as usual'? What habits, assumptions and paradigms do we need to question and change in order to respond effectively and sustainably (e.g. our concepts of the 'good life', the role and place of coaching)?
- b. What are the ethical implications of our global situation? What are our own ethical positions? How are the two connected for each of us?
- c. How well do we understand 'sustainability' and its application to our personal and professional lives? What are our footprints?
- d. How do people and societies change? What is the connection between coaching and social change? Between social change and personal change (including our own?!)
- e. What gives coaches and coaching its strength? What elements of coaching need to be honoured and brought forward? What needs to be released or 'let go of' so that coaching can evolve?
- f. How can we be more open to learning about ourselves, others, and our urgent needs? What do we need to know, particularly from domains outside of coaching?
- g. How do we enhance our own self-care and become even more agile and resilient? What do we need to be more candid about and grieve in these times?
- h. What are we called to do? What is the 'work' we need to do to get us ready for the future?
- i. How can we create a personal manifesto for the conference that will passionately engage us?

How do we honour the journey we have been on as professionals AND adapt to the urgent needs of a future that is upon us?

2. Building more Sustainable Practices

In the afternoon of the first day, the focus is on exploring what it will take to run practices, internal projects and businesses that will be commercially, energetically, socially and ecologically sustainable. As part of this process, what would open up for us if we stepped fully into this time? What is being asked of us and what is important to focus on right now? In creating stronger ties between our life and our work, we can develop greater personal responsibility.

We are seeking proposals for sessions that help participants address questions such as:

- a. What would we discover and do if we were better at reflective practice, critical thinking, and ethical decision-making in running our businesses and projects?
- b. What would happen if we developed new ways of thinking about our work and our practices (e.g. more holistically and relationally/ecologically than individually and competitively)?
- c. How do we understand and create 'third spaces' outside of existing polarities in order to create better solutions for ourselves and our clients?
- d. What future do we want to support and contribute to creating, locally and globally? What really is the 'bigger game' we may need to be playing?
- e. What does commercial and professional 'success' mean now; how has this changed? What are the key trends in coaching and in our clients; how do these inform our views of success?
- f. Where are the business opportunities in this crisis? How do we present these effectively and authentically? How do we best engage with these opportunities?
- g. How do we need to 'show up' differently in partnering with our clients?

How do we courageously and creatively engage in the challenges of our time AND run a viable and sustainable practice?

3. Developing more Sustainable Leadership

In the morning of the second day, the focus is on exploring the call to new leadership, both for ourselves and for our clients. As part of this process, what is being asked of us now as professionals and leaders and what is ours to do for the greater good? What kind of leaders and leadership do we need now and how will coaching support this development? In creating stronger ties between our work and the needs of/for leadership, we attain a greater degree of professional viability.

We are seeking proposals for sessions that help participants address questions such as:

- a. What is the leadership question being asked of us now in these uncertain times? What do leaders need – and what might this imply in terms of how coaching needs to change?
- b. What are the contexts in which our leadership occurs? To whom are we/could we be leaders? What are the leadership challenges and opportunities associated with these contexts?
- c. What are the links between culture change and coaching, between organisational development and psychology, between context and process in coaching?
- d. How do we and our clients make the values shifts that need to occur? What is the relative weight and priority we give to 'professional ethics' versus 'global ethics'? In what ways do they conflict and how do we manage this?
- e. How do we dare to challenge our clients? What is the role of advocacy in coaching? What challenges to our courage and confidence are presented in exercising the full potential of our own leadership, and how do we summon this?
- f. What information, knowledge and skills do you need to contribute to the solution? What new forms of coaching, and new ways of using coaching, do we need to meet these challenges and opportunities?
- g. How can we engender more experiments and innovations in coaching? How do we be more transparent and engaged in learning from our challenges and mistakes?
- h. What unique and innovative contributions can coaches make to the significant issues related to sustainability, climate change, poverty, etc.? What is the contribution you wish to make?

How can we be client-centred and non-directive AND be advocates and leaders for a more sustainable future?

4. Enabling more Sustainable Organisations and Communities

In the afternoon of the second day, the focus is on exploring how to bring coaching to bear on larger scale systems and in greater partnership with other disciplines in order to address complex issues. As part of this process, how can we collaborate in new ways, where will we begin and how will we keep it going? In creating stronger ties between leadership and the needs of our social and natural environments, we attain a greater hope for global sustainability.

We are seeking proposals for sessions that help participants address questions such as:

- a. What do organisations and communities need and want from coaches and coaching now – and what does this imply in terms of how coaching needs to change?
- b. What classic gifts from coaching will be helpful in moving forward? What else do we need to understand?
- c. What does coaching look like and become when exercised in fostering sustainability on a larger scale, such as in an entire organisation or community?
- d. In what ways might our national and local (state) coaching communities exercise leadership for sustainability together? What other forms of collaboration might be needed?
- e. What case studies can you share that outline the means by which to engage large client systems in developing coaching capacities and cultures?
- f. How can we use new technologies and advances in social media to reinvent our coaching business to serve more people across broader reaches?
- g. Are we being imaginative, bold and courageous enough to step up to the opportunities we face? What else is needed?
- h. What is your legacy? What is coaching's legacy?
- i. What new awareness, inspiration, ideas, relationships and plans are you taking from this conference? How will you sustain yourself on this path? What specific connections and commitments do you want to make?

Online lodgement of submissions will open 10 January 2009. Early submissions are encouraged and much appreciated. Please allow extra time for international submissions. Faxed and/or emailed submissions will NOT be accepted. **NO LATE PROPOSALS ACCEPTED**
2. Deadline submission date is 28 February 2009. Proposals selected will be notified by 31 March 2009.
3. Please indicate on the submission form the specific track(s) to which you are submitting your proposal.
4. Concurrent break-out sessions for each track will be either 60 or 90 minutes in length. Please indicate on the submission form if your presentation would best be given in only 60 minutes, only 90 minutes or if you are able to adapt to either time frame.
5. Presenters need to be prepared to speak to between 60 and 200 participants.
6. You are required to register for the conference and, should your proposal be accepted, will automatically receive the early bird member rate. In the spirit of professional sharing among peers, we do not pay registration costs or make payment to presenters who are selected to speak through this Call for Proposals.
In acknowledgement of the contribution made by selected presenters, ICF Australasia will have each concurrent presenter's photograph, biography and website link displayed on the ICF Australasia Website
8. You must provide references for 2 people who have heard you speak and 2 references who have hired you to speak.
9. An audio or audiovisual recording is desired as part of your proposal but not mandatory. If you include a tape it does not need to be on the proposed subject matter but does need to be of an actual presentation not a description of the presenters speaking skills. If your proposal is for a Coaching Demonstration or includes a coaching demonstration, then the proposal ideally should contain an audio or audiovisual recording of an actual coaching session. Please note supplied recordings will not be returned.
10. Selling products, services or training is not acceptable in your session. Persons submitting proposals perceived as selling services,

products or training are invited to participate as an exhibitor or sponsor, and sell their products or services in the specially marked areas or in the conference bookstore.

11. Proposals from non-ICF members are welcomed. Individuals are invited to join the ICF in order to take advantage of member rates and benefits. In the event that a member and a non-member submit proposals for sessions that appear similar, preference will be given to the ICF member.
12. We reiterate that our intention is to provide new, innovative and challenging ideas to the participants and so, we ask that you identify whether your material has been delivered at any other conference or event in the Australasian Region, within the last year or may be presented prior to the 2009 ICF Australasia Conference. Peer-reviewed research presentations are exempted from this requirement.

Selection Process

Submissions will be considered using a peer review process. The Core Conference Team members will create a team of senior coaches (and content experts as necessary) to review proposals and make recommendations to the Conference Executive Team chaired by the ICF Australasia Director of Events. The Executive Team will make a recommendation for the conference program to the ICF Australasia Board of Directors for acceptance. All decisions by the Board are final.

The process is transparent and open to ICFA Board members and those involved in developing the conference. All presentations will be reviewed by at least three independent peers. Where a coach is a reviewer and also seeking selection as a presenter, a separate panel of three reviewers will be employed.

Proposals are welcome from all professionals. In the event that an ICF member and a non-member submit proposals for sessions that appear similar, preference will be given to the ICF member.

Selection Guidelines

We seek sessions that are:

- directly related to the conference theme
- interactive and dialogical
- challenging and constructive
- forward thinking and paradigm shifting
- well-grounded and inspiring
- provide practical tools and move people to action.

Selection Criteria

Content (50% of total score) will be reviewed for:

- Relevance to conference theme "Creating Future Stories Together"
- Personal responsibility: Challenges delegates to see things differently and take personal responsibility for action that links to our shared global future
- Professional viability: Provides innovative business models, skills and ideas about how to sustain a coaching business AND address global sustainability
- Global sustainability: Links the personal stories to the global picture; provides information about sustainability and where coaching could help; assists delegates in creating a vision and a path forward
- Relevance to the particular stream of the conference the proposal is addressing (as outlined above);
- Clearly stated objectives (what learning is expected to occur; which ICF core competencies will be addressed; what researched theories and knowledge will be used; and what can participants hope to gain as a result)
- Global appeal (relevance to the international coaching community and impact in the field)

Process (25% of total score) will be reviewed for:

- Instructional methods
- Degree of participant involvement: active learning, participatory experience, spirit and connection developed among participants
- Degree to which the participants are inspired and supported to think BIG
- Degree to which participants are inspired and supported to take action in the session, during the conference or following the conference
- Feasibility of the programme design to fit in the time frame chosen
